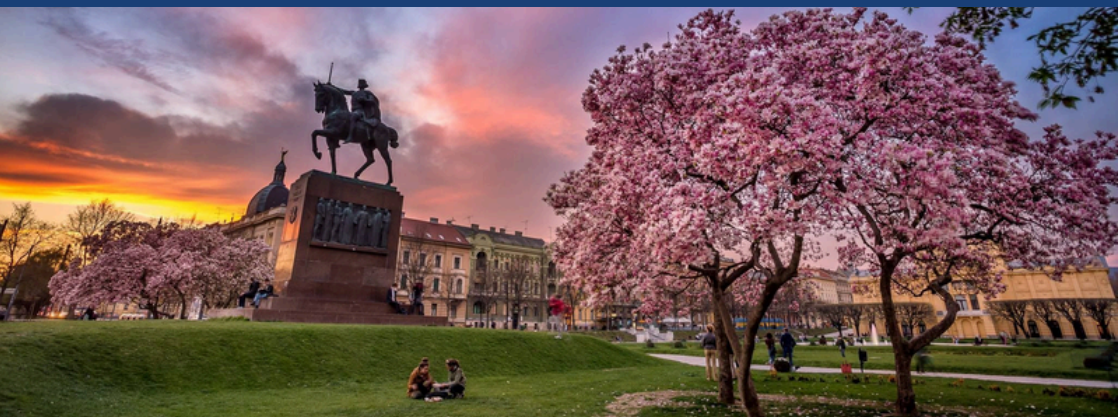

Language of Institution & Language Requirements

Generally, the language of instruction is **Croatian**, but a number of courses for Erasmus students are held in **English**. The incoming students can attend the course **Croatian language and Culture for Foreigners (6 ECTS)**.

The **language requirements** for the incoming students (in reading, listening, writing, and speaking): level B1 on the CEFR scale (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) or equivalent.



Admission procedure

Once nominated, students must apply the following documents:

- Registration Form of the "Baltazar Zaprešić" University of Applied Sciences
- One photo in color
- Transcript of Records
- OLA - Learning Agreement signed by the student and the respective coordinator in charge at the home institution
- Copy of the ID card or passport (first page with the photo • and personal data)
- *Optional*: proof of language proficiency (minimum B1). Documents must be sent by email to international@bak.hr.

Entering Croatia

According to the law regarding foreigners, foreign nationals intending to study in Croatia must regulate their **temporary residence** for the purpose of studying if their stay in Croatia is longer than 90 days.

All foreign students also must have medical **insurance covered during their stay in Croatia**. EU nationals must have European Health Insurance Card (EHIC). Non EU nationals should check with the healthcare provider at home and/or their home university.

Pre-arrival arrangements

You can search for **private accommodation** either in Zaprešić or Zagreb. Prices are approximately 400-500 EUR per month for a single room or 600 for a studio apartment. The offer is better in Zagreb and there is a good public transportation connection to Zaprešić (30 min by bus or train).

Average monthly **living expenses** in Croatia are estimated to be between 600 and 800 EUR depending on the type of accommodation, student needs and lifestyle. These amounts should be enough to cover food, accommodation, utilities, books, transportation and miscellaneous expenses.

Croatian Traditions

Klapa Singing

Traditional a cappella singing from Dalmatia, characterized by harmonized male or female voices. Klapa is recognized by UNESCO as part of Croatia's intangible cultural heritage.

Licitar Hearts

Colorful, hand-decorated gingerbread hearts, traditionally given as tokens of love and friendship, especially around Christmas and Valentine's Day.

Pag Lace-Making

Intricate lacework traditionally made by hand on the island of Pag, each piece is unique and requires weeks or even months to complete.

Carnival (Rijeka Carnival)

A vibrant celebration before Lent featuring parades, costumes, and the burning of a man-like effigy called "Pust" to symbolically cleanse away sins and misfortunes.

Dalmatian Prosciutto (Pršut)

Dry-cured ham traditionally salted and aged by the strong bura wind in Dalmatia, known for its distinctive, rich flavor.

Bečarac Singing

Humorous, rhymed songs typically performed at social gatherings in Slavonia, known for their lively rhythms and playful, sometimes cheeky lyrics.

Slavonian Kulen

A unique smoked sausage made from ground pork and red paprika, prized in Slavonia and often served during festivals and celebrations.





What to see in Croatia?

Dubrovnik (The "Pearl of the Adriatic") – This historic city, with its medieval walls and stunning views over the Adriatic Sea, is a UNESCO World Heritage site. Walk along the city walls, explore the marble streets of the Old Town, and take a cable car ride up Mount Srđ for panoramic views.



Plitvice Lakes National Park – Known for its cascading lakes, crystal-clear waterfalls, and lush forests, Plitvice is one of Croatia's most iconic natural wonders. The park's wooden pathways lead visitors over turquoise lakes and through scenic landscapes, making it a dream for nature lovers.



Split and Diocletian's Palace – In the coastal city of Split, visitors can explore the ancient Roman Diocletian's Palace, which is seamlessly integrated into the modern city. Wander through narrow alleyways, visit bustling local markets, and enjoy the lively Riva promenade by the sea.



Hvar and the Dalmatian Islands – Known for sunny beaches, lavender fields, and vibrant nightlife, Hvar island is ideal for relaxing and exploring historical sites like the Fortica fortress. Nearby islands like Brač (with its famous Zlatni Rat beach) and Vis (a peaceful escape) add to the allure of the Dalmatian archipelago.



Istria (Rovinj, Motovun, and Pula) – The Istrian Peninsula offers charming coastal towns and hilltop villages. Rovinj captivates with its colorful seaside houses, Motovun is known for truffle hunting and vineyards, and Pula boasts a well-preserved Roman amphitheater still used for events.





What to see in Zagreb?



Ban Jelačić Square – The heart of Zagreb and its central meeting point, this lively square is surrounded by cafes, shops, and historic buildings, and is a great starting place for exploring the city.

Zagreb Cathedral – With its towering twin spires, this Gothic-style cathedral is a symbol of Zagreb. It houses beautiful frescoes and altars, as well as historical artifacts from Croatia's religious history.



St. Mark's Church – Known for its colorful tiled roof featuring the coat of arms of Croatia, Dalmatia, and Slavonia, St. Mark's is one of Zagreb's most iconic landmarks, located in the charming Upper Town (Gornji Grad).

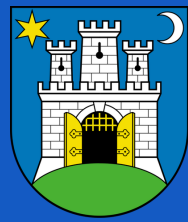

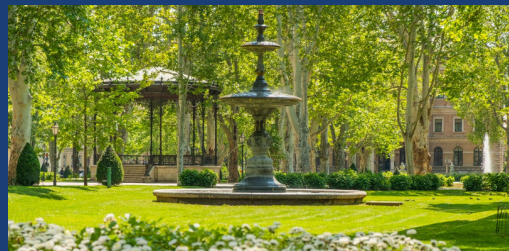

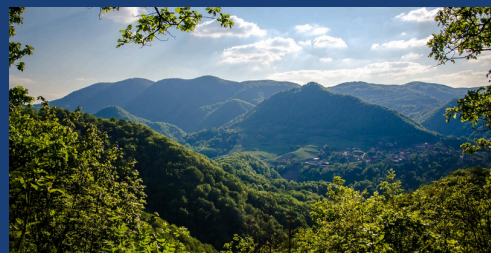
